



PASSPORTS

If you have an Irish passport, you can enter Japan as a visitor for up to **90 days without a visa**. Your passport should be valid for the proposed duration of your stay. Check it now! Japanese law requires you to present your passport when requested by a police officer or other authorised officer. If your passport is lost or stolen, this should be reported at a police station and you should ensure that you receive a police report.

If your **passport has expired**, you can apply to renew it online using the online Passport Renewal Service. www.dfa.ie/passportonline

Follow the rules

Please be respectful of local laws and customs.

Illegal drug use is a serious crime in Japan and can lead to long prison terms, stiff penalties or deportation. There is a zero tolerance approach taken to all illegal drug use in Japan and the consequences will be severe.

Loud, boisterous or anti-social behaviour is not as acceptable in Japan as it is elsewhere.

Travel Insurance

We strongly recommend that before travelling you purchase comprehensive travel insurance that covers your stay in Japan and all your planned activities. You may be expected to pay the costs of treatment received before claiming back from your insurance company.


In case of Emergency

Medication

There are restrictions on the importation of some over-the-counter and prescription medicines. Please check with the Japanese Embassy in Dublin and the Japanese Ministry of Health, Labour and Welfare webpage for advice well in advance if you plan to bring medicine into Japan. www.mhlw.go.jp/english/policy/health-medical/pharmaceuticals/01.html

Cash

The currency used in Japan is the Japanese Yen. Please note that many smaller shops and restaurants will only take cash payments. ATMs which will accept overseas cards are generally available, particularly in convenience stores such as '7/11'. Many of these are open 24/7. We advise you, however, to contact your financial institution before travelling to Japan to check if your cards will be valid.

Natural Disasters

Japan is highly susceptible to earthquakes, typhoons and other natural disasters. We strongly advise that Irish citizens travelling to Japan familiarise themselves with the measures to take in the event of an earthquake or natural disaster, and follow the advice of local authorities in any such situation.
